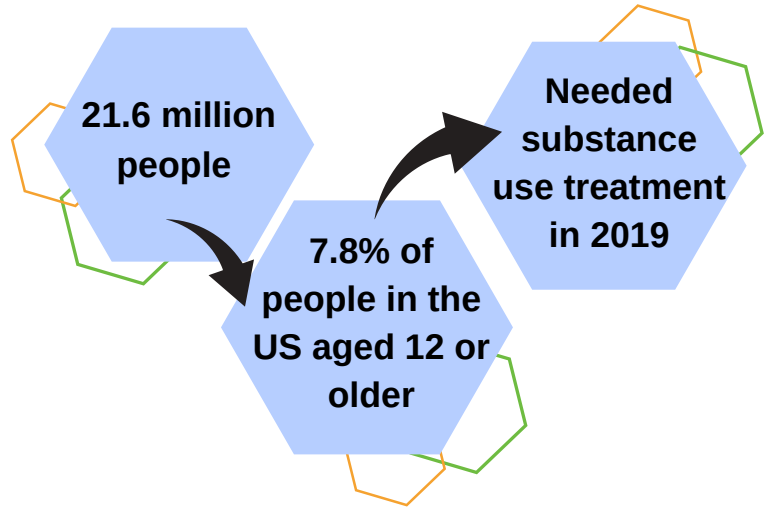
21 million
 People needed substance use treatment in 2019



4 million
 People received some form substance use treatment



742,000
 People received both substance use and mental health treatment



Of the 9.5 million people with a co-occurring disorder only 742,000 people are treated for both substance use and mental health disorders. This is only 7.8% of the co-occurring population in the US.¹

Over 55% of those who have co-occurring disorders do not receive any treatment.²

Patients with a co-occurring disorder have poorer rates of treatment adherence and higher rates of treatment dropout compared to those without a MI.³
