

Hawai'i 4-H Alumni/Weinberg High School Senior Scholarship

Scholarships of up to \$1,500 (\$750 for community or junior college) will be awarded to current 4-H members who have completed at least one year of 4-H work prior to March 1 of the year the application is received. The applicant will need to be enrolled full-time in their freshman year at an accredited college, university, technical, or trade school in the fall of the year the applications are due.

Candidate should submit the following materials to the County 4-H Extension Agent before the date designated by the agent.

1. Scholarship Application Form, including signatures (digital signatures will be accepted) of the 4-Her, parent/guardian, and club leader
2. Individual's photograph (headshot for publicity)
3. Copy of official high school transcript
4. Two letters of recommendation, one from a teacher, academic advisor, or counselor and the other at large
5. Copy of first page (or page that shows adjusted gross income) of family's most current 1040 tax form for verification of annual income.

The application and support items 2–4 must be **received** by *April 3, 2021*. Late applications will **not** be accepted as the alumni board will meet on April 6th. Send to

A committee will review the applications submitted and determine the scholarship winner(s) based on

- a. Financial information
- b. Experiences in 4-H
- c. 4-H citizenship/leadership experiences
- d. Academic information

Scholarship awards will be paid to the institution that the applicant attends upon verification that the applicant is a bona fide student. Scholarship recipient must follow the instructions that will be in the notification letter to ensure timely award of the scholarship. Two payments will be made, one for fall semester and one for spring semester.

Scholastic Achievement (25 points) As indicated by grade-point average, class rank, national testing scores, and academic honors received.	12.5%
Growth Through 4-H Projects and Activities (25 points) As shown by knowledge, skills, and insights gained; scope and sophistication of projects and activities; breadth and depth of participation; development of life skills; and information shared with others.	12.5%
Growth Through 4-H Leadership (15 points) As evidenced by offices and leadership positions held at various levels and accomplishments in leadership roles.	7.5%
Growth Through 4-H Citizenship and Community Service (15 points) As demonstrated by the extent of participation in service to individuals, groups, and communities; and by the development of positive attitudes toward service.	7.5%
Growth Through Leadership, Citizenship, and Activities Outside 4-H (10 points) As indicated by offices and leadership positions held, experiences gained, and participation in service projects in school and in other youth, community, and religious organizations.	5%
Personal Growth and Development Through 4-H (10 points) As shown by attitudes, insights, and life skills gained through 4-H projects, experiences, leadership, and citizenship and service activities; and by clarity and appropriateness of educational and career choices.	5%
