# HAWAIIAN YOUTHS ABROAD

ESTABLISHED 1880 ~ REINSTATED 2018

### THE COUNTRY & THE PROGRAM

Between 1880 and 1887, 18 Hawaiians participated in the Hawaiian Youths Abroad program in six different countries around the world: Italy, Scotland, England, China, Japan, and the United States. The 17 young men and 1 young woman were selected by King Kalākaua to become future leaders of an independent and progressive nation, the Hawaiian

Kingdom. The program was embedded in the Hawaiian Kingdom Foreign Affairs office, and arguably was designed as both an educational and foreign diplomatic training program to prepare future leaders in core government functions. The program's very creation, design and eventual demise are reflective of the social and political conditions and concerns of the time. Its legislative creation and appropriation are testament to the progressive state of the Hawaiian Kingdom at the time, as a program funded by a country at the time was quite unprecedented in the world. The program and its participants were a source of pride and inspiration by Hawaiian nationals watching their progress at home,

while also a source of jealousy and

spite by the growing body of traitors

illegally infiltrating the Hawaiian


Kingdom, which led to the eventual

ending of government support for

the program just months before the

illegal overthrow of the Hawaiian

Kingdom government in 1893.


