CLFC Recruitment Meeting Fall 2022

October 10, 2022

On October 10, 2022, the UHM Chinese Flagship Associate Director, Prof Li 'Julie' Jiang, led a meeting attended by three faculty members, eight instructors/ GAs, two Student Ambassadors, and a Student Council member. The purpose of the meeting was to kindle a campuswide interest in Chinese language learning and to increase overall Chinese program enrollment. The faculty and instructors were quizzed on their Chinese majors, minors, and Flagship

Program knowledge. The current situation was assessed, challenges were identified, and good news was shared. New initiatives and other existing activities to promote Chinese at UHM were highlighted as well. The information included things like new coursework as well as current and future study abroad program options. The workshop concluded with a brainstorming session and closing remarks by Prof Song Jiang



Reflections by Alumni

1. How best can precapstone students prepare for departure to Taiwan?

"I think the best way to help precapstone students be prepared for their capstone year is to remind them to keep an open mind to what you'll be learning and experiencing in another country. Especially if you've never been abroad before. It's really easy for people to not get the most out of the experience by not immersing themselves in the local communities because it is tempting to stick to things you are comfortable with and remain close-minded and closed off to the world around you. I encourage precapstone students to really engage and make new friends within the local community on their own! You'll learn a lot!" (Adriana)

"The best way for students to prepare for the departure to Taiwan is to try to watch media content produced by Taiwanese people, whether it is travel or food vlogs or other content, so you can have a better understanding of the area and how the locals interact. Also, this process will help students with getting used to the Taiwanese accent because a lot of times we are so used to being exposed to the mainland accent that it makes it difficult to adapt to the Taiwanese accent immediately." 2. What was rewarding about your Capstone experience?

"I think the most rewarding experience that I got through Capstone was being able to make lifelong friends that I still keep in touch with (they also help me a lot with brushing up my Chinese since it's been pretty dormant when I got back)." (Adriana)

"The most rewarding experience of the Capstone year is being able to take classes in Chinese and experiencing the Taiwanese educational system along with local students. Also, the internship is very valuable as you are able to use your language skills in a professional setting." (Elizabeth)

3. Where were your favorite places to visit in Taipei and the rest of Taiwan?

"My favorite places to visit in Taipei definitely had to be Taipei Main Station because it is the most convenient place to be in Taipei and Yuanshan station because they always have crafts fairs, really cool food events, and also queer events hosted there!" (Adriana)

"My favorite place in Taipei is Ximending, since it has the best mix of shopping, food, and entertainment. Ximending is so convenient because it caters to locals and foreigners alike. As for the rest of Taiwan, I enjoyed Yilan the most because there are many beautiful beaches and mountains to explore. I felt like Yilan was similar to Hawaii in the sense that you are able to go to the mountain to hike and then cool off with a stroll at the beach." (Elizabeth)

4. How has your Chinese Flagship experience helped you with your future academic studies and/or professional career?

"Chinese Flagship experience has helped given me clarity with what I'd potentially want to use Chinese for in my future career. I'm extremely grateful for the opportunity that Flagship has offered me, and the experiences that I had abroad will forever be cherished." (Adriana)

"After graduation, I was able to resume my career in the beauty industry, and am currently working at an international luxury beauty brand. This allows me to use Chinese to communicate with different contract manufacturers and clients. It's amazing to be able to bridge the gap of communication between the English and Chinese speakers."
