October 18, 2022

The UHM Chinese Flagship Coordinator Orion Young, the GA Hsin-Tzu Jen, and a Student Ambassador Molly Wolyn along with their Korean Flagship counterparts tabled at the National Association for College Admission Counseling (NACAC) College Fair at the Hawaii Convention Center in Downtown Honolulu. There were two sessions in total – a morning session from 8:30-11:30am and an evening session from 5:00-8:00pm. The first session saw high school students from all over Oahu arriving via school bus as a field trip. The second session saw mainly parents accompanying their

teenage children. NACAC College Fairs are held nationwide and are free and open to the public, allowing students to interact with admission representatives from a wide range of postsecondary institutions. The Honolulu leg hosted dozens of local universities as well as close to a hundred national and international universities. Over a hundred students received brochures and then used their phone apps to be scanned by Flagship, twenty of whom expressed interest specifically in Chinese Flagship. The coordinator sent out information about the program electronically the following day. (Orion)

October 24, 2022: Tea Time

STUDENT HIGHLIGHTS

Experience Regarding Pre-Capstone Preparation

Preparing for capstone was a journey. During summer break, I worked on my application materials which included a video, essay, and resume in English and Chinese. When school started, I began to prepare for the language assessment. I took a few practice tests, and I felt ready. When it was time for the actual test, I completely bombed it. I did not manage my time well, and I just randomly answered the last 10 questions. I felt very doubtful of my score. After waiting for almost a month, I found out that I did not pass. I was extremely disappointed but more irritated at myself for getting so close. I also felt as if I spent nearly all of my college years preparing for capstone, only to be let down by a score on a test.

But, I was lucky to have a second chance. So, I fueled my anger into determination. I devoted an hour every day to practicing reading and listening, while also having great tutors to help me. I listened to podcasts during my commute to school, watched Chinese YouTubers, and tried to only speak Mandarin at home. Over the weekend, I watched Chinese news segments regarding politics and the economy. I was also stumped by a lot of the simplified characters on the test, having only used traditional characters all my life, so that was a challenge. I switched my keyboard settings, read all my class material in simplified, and borrowed books in simplified. Basically, I did everything that I could to be immersed in Chinese.

The second time around, I felt more confident during the reading section and was able to manage my time better. When I got my test score back, I was so relieved that I passed. All the hard work paid off, and a great weight was lifted off my shoulders. This capstone is very important to me, not only because my mother is from Taiwan, but also because I have a lot of fond memories there and wish to make more. Although I am a bit nervous about taking on such a rigorous program, I know that it will challenge me in the best way possible.

Lastly, I am thankful to the Chinese Flagship for helping me along the way and challenging me to achieve greater goals.



ACADEMIC DEVELOPMENT

The Design of CHN 411 Advanced Mandarin Conversation

Developed by Prof Haidan Wang and different from general language courses, CHN 411 Advanced Mandarin Conversation really put emphasis on students' development of oral proficiency. As per the syllabus, this course has an Oral Communication Focus, and provides students the opportunity to develop their skills of conversing in Mandarin at the Advanced Level on the ACTFL (American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages) proficiency scale, or 2 to 2+ on the ACTFL/ILR (Interagency Language Roundtable) scale.

Throughout the course, students will receive training in the use of appropriate social protocols and communicative practices for a variety of living and working settings with people speaking Mandarin. The goals of this course are to provide instructions that enable students to narrate, describe, compare, and contrast in paragraph-length discourse that is coherent, complex, and engaging, as well as socially and culturally appropriate in Mandarin.

The overall learning objectives of CHN 411 are as follows:

- 1. be able to comprehend the spoken Chinese and satisfy routine social demands and limited work requirement.
- 2. develop speaking strategies and be able to converse with command of appropriate vocabulary and complex linguistic structures.
- 3. become familiar with the format of ACTFL (/ILR) Oral Proficiency Interview (OPIs), and able to participate in most formal and informal interactions with cohesive discourse to a certain extent.
- 4. be able to verbally perform at Advanced or emerging Superior level with fluency and accuracy, mostly in paragraph length.
- 5. be able to give and understand complicated, detailed, and extensive directions and make nonroutine changes in such situations as travel and accommodation arrangements. (Hsin-Tzu)
