# **Chinese Corner**

### October 23, 2023: Chinese Charades

Our fourth Chinese Corner of Fall 2023 was hosted by our student volunteer, Kimberly Baston. This week's activity focused on Chinese Charades, or 你比 我猜. The game consisted of two teams competing against each other to finish their word set the fastest.

One person was chosen as the wordguesser and was to stand in front of their team. Another team member was to stand behind the guesser while holding up a sign with Chinese words on it, making sure everyone in their team except the guesser knew the word. As for the rest of the team, they had to act out or use Chinese to describe the word to the guesser. The guesser has the most crucial role in the game, since their ability to decipher what word their teammates are showing them determines how quickly they can progress through their word set. Words came in varying levels of difficulty, including words like Spongebob Squarepants (海绵宝 宝), Snow White (白雪公主), and swimming (游泳).

Overall, this event successfully encouraged participants to use their Chinese to work together while having a friendly competition with fellow Chinese-learners! (Molly)

#### November 06, 2023: Chinese Opera Masks

The fifth Chinese Corner was hosted by our student ambassador, Molly Wolyn. The activity was about Chinese Opera (戏曲) and Beijing Opera masks (京剧脸谱).

The first half of the activity consisted of a presentation on the history of Beijing Opera and the meaning of the colored masks worn by the characters featured onstage. Afterward, we invited attendees to take what they have learned from the presentation and paint their own masks. We offered a multitude of different masks shapes at our activity, such as the fox face, the wide faced human, or the skinny-faced human. Once they decided on which mask they wanted to paint, they were given a collection

of Beijing Opera mask designs to draw inspiration from. While some students followed the provided templates, other students decided to paint their own unique and creative designs.

Finally, after everyone had finished painting their masks and were ready for wearing, the Chinese Flagship Instagram (@hichineseflagship) hosted a popularity poll, asking followers to vote for their favorite designs. The attendee with the most votes, Noelani Ramon – who made a beautiful fox mask decorated with lotus flower theming, embellished with a symmetrical design using predominantly red and green

### November 20, 2023: Chinese Stamps

The last Chinese Corner of the Fall 23 semester received an influx of students eager to make their own name stamps (姓名印章). This concluding event was hosted by our guest, Yu-Sheng Chang Laoshi, a visiting scholar from Taiwan.

The event began with the collection of the attendees' Chinese names in order to format them for printing onto a piece of paper.

After a quick introduction on what to do, attendees were then given a standard eraser, crafting knife, see-through paper, and the paper with their Chinese names printed on top. First, attendees had to trace their name onto the seethrough paper, making sure it was written dark enough, and that it was coated with enough lead dust. Then, they pasted the paper onto their eraser. This process allows them to print their names onto the eraser, creating guiding lines to assist them when they eventually carve their names with the knife.

After a lot of patience and precision during the carving process, the names were finally ready for stamping! Apart from the standard red and black colors, attendees were also given a selection of colorful inks to choose from. Our enthusiastic attendees hurriedly began practicing stamping their name onto a piece of paper, ambitious to perfect the ideal, clean print.

At the end of the event, our student attendees shared their thoughts and impressions on name-carving. They expressed that certain names, due to their complicated structure, were difficult to carve compared to other names with simpler structures. And with the closing of this event, the Chinese Corner events of the Fall 2023 semester can now be declared complete!

# **Boren Scholarship**

Boren Scholars study a wide range of critical languages, including Chinese, Arabic, Portuguese, and so forth. Boren scholarships are available to undergraduate students of all proficiency levels who are committed to enhancing their skills. Maximum awards are determined by duration abroad:

- Up to \$25,000 for 25-52 weeks (preferred)
- Up to \$12,500 for 12-24 weeks
- Up to \$8,000 for 8-11 weeks (STEM majors only)

The 2024-2025 Boren Scholarship application cycle is now open. The application deadline for the Boren Scholarship is **January 31**, **2024** at 5:00 p.m. ET. To apply, please visit: <u>https://www.borenawards.org/apply-now</u>



# Gilman-McCain Scholarship

The Gilman-McCain Scholarship provides awards of \$5,000 for child and spousal dependents of active or activated United States military personnel during the time of application (see <u>website</u> for details) to study or intern abroad on credit-bearing programs. The application is now open for applicants whose in-person programs or internships start between February 1, 2024 to October 31, 2024. This cycle encompasses Spring 2024, Maymester 2024, Summer 2024, Fall 2024, and academic year 2024-2025 programs. The deadlines are:

- Application: Thursday, January 4, 2024, Pacific Time
- Advisor certification: Thursday, January 11, 2024, Pacific Time
