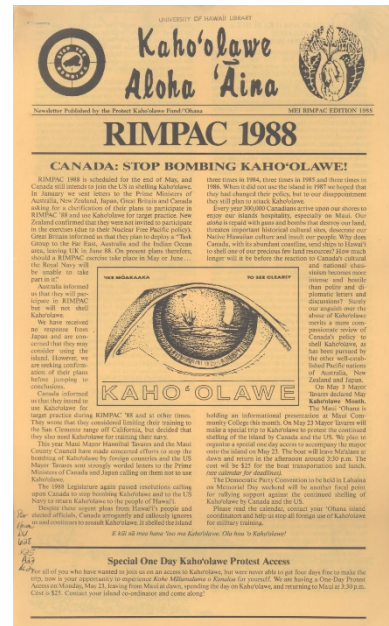

The Hawaiian Collection at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa is the world's most comprehensive research collection on the subject of Hawai'i. The backbone of the collection is our vast and diverse holdings of those publications published periodically, commonly known as serials in libraries. Individually, these materials document the activities of their creators and the stories they tell. Collectively and historically, they reflect the communities they are a part of, which help us today draw new meanings and understandings on who we are, where we've been, and where we are going.
