## The Creation of the Work

Who is the Author?	Who is the Publisher?
What are the author's: credentials? education? past writing? experience? Does the author's background connect to this research area?	<ul><li>Is it a university press or a large reputable publisher?</li><li>Is it from a government agency?</li><li>Is the source self-published?</li><li>Is the source peer reviewed (as happens with academic presses)?</li><li>Did experts evaluate the quality of the content before it was published?</li></ul>

	Who is the sponsor? - try finding the "About Us" page What is the high-level domain? (.edu, .com, .gov, .uk, .au)
