On the Big Island the biggest upset was a man named Clement Akina who ousted Spencer the veteran. Tonight the Lion's club is meeting in Ewa and having the Double Ten celebration— the Chinese celebration of their liberation from Manchuria— the speaker is to be a Mr. Kelley 66 Kam Schools who was in a Japanese prison camp, and was repatriated. They asked me to go, but I don't think I will.
