NARRATIVE OF EVENTS

December 1945

The 442d Infantry Regiment continued its assignment of guarding PW enclosures, hospitals, salvage dumps, petrol points, and medical depots. Additional duties were undertaken with two platoons of Company I detailed as train guards to commute between Naples and Leghorn per letter, Headquarters Peninsular Base Section, file No. 370.5 BPGCT, dated 27 November 1945.

On 4 December 1945, Colonel Virgil R. Miller, Regimental Commander, left the unit for a month's furlough in the United States. Lieutenant Colonel Alfred A. Pursall, Executive Officer, assumed command during the temporary absence of Colonel Miller, per par 1, GO #69 Headquarters 442d Regimental Combat Team, dated 4 December 1945.

Mr. Joe Farrell, 442d Red Cross Director, left for home on 2 December after 7 month's service with the Regiment.

Ninety-nine EM possessing the necessary points, were bon voyaged to replacement depots to be ultimately discharged. To offset this loss in personnel, 55 replacements, who since October had been attached to PBS, were assigned but not joined to the 442d Infantry Regiment. Their release from duty with PBS units was withheld pending the "breaking-in" of other replacements. Fourteen officers were assigned to the unit during the month.

Chaplain (Capt) George Aki was relieved of the bulk of ministerial duties with the addition of two new chaplains. Chaplain (Capt) Roland R. Young was assigned to administer to the spiritual needs of the 3d Battalion while Chaplain (Capt) John C. Craig assumed his duties at the 2d Battalion.

The reenlistment campaign was continued throughout the month and twelve more men signed up for various periods with the Regular Army.

Actively engaged in sports, the 442d Infantry Regiment contributed much to the entertainment of the Peninsular Base Section. Although the 442d quintet had started off rather shakily the previous month by losing its first game of the season, it quickly rounded the rough edges and went on a rampage, easily trouncing four teams successively, in as many games. Smooth coordination, teamplay, plus rabid rooting on the part of Regimental supporters contributed much to its success on the court.

The 442d football team, after a short layoff with the close of the regular season, played the champion 351st team from the 88th Division on 25 December at the Yankee Stadium, Italy, as a special treat for sport fans. Going into the game as underdogs, the 442d eleven dominated the game and won a hard-earned victory over the previously unbeaten and unscored on representatives from the "Blue Devils".

Imbued with the spirit of giving, the different battalions held "Bambini" parties for the unfortunate and homeless orphans. The 100th Bn held its party at the "Co For Broke" Club, playing host to approximately 300 children. The

2d Bn sponsored two separate parties, with Companies E and G holding a party in their area, and Hq Co and F giving the other in the F Company area. The 3d Bn also gladdened many a youthful heart with its gala party for the orphans from the area of Pisa and its vicinity. The men from the 3d Bn donated approximately \$750.00, and this sum was used to buy 3l pairs of shoes and 175 pairs of stockings. Well over 350 bambini came to this party.
