## Notes:

Students may progress more quickly through their foreign language sequence by taking a placement exam and/or summer courses. Second language must be in one of the following: Arabic, Chinese, Filipino, Hindi, Ilokano, Indonesian, Japanese, Khmer (Cambodian), Korean, Pali, Sanskrit, Thai, or Vietnamese.

Students must have a total of 15 credits in ASAN classes, which include ASAN 201 and 202 plus ASAN 310 or 312. Classes in the focus and outside focus do not have to come from Asian Studies but they must be at the 300 and 400 level.

Students cannot mix and match between discipline and geographic based.

Students must incorporate all focus requirements into this plan. Focus designations (i.e., W, E, O, H) are CRN specific & semester specific.

Minimum 60 upper division (300+ course) credits are required.
