CPS by the Numbers


Over the past 50 years, the Center for Philippine Studies has made longstanding impact in advancing academics, representation, and programming. Here is a snapshot of our progress.



The course debuts in the 2024–2025 academic year at Farrington, Waipahu, Dreamhouse Charter, Maryknoll, and McKinley High Schools.

Anniversary Cultural Production

In celebration of the CPS's 50th anniversary at UHM, CPS will partner with the Department of Theatre and Dance and produce the first Kennedy Theatre Main Stage Concert to celebrate the history of Filipinos in Hawai'i and the diaspora. It will feature student and community performances from local and international collaborations. Aimed to increase cultural resilience and awareness through performing arts, this project celebrates and makes new connections between various performing arts as tools for building Filipino diasporic identity and community.
