This lecture will give an overview of Philippine music on the following topics:

- Philippine Indigenous Music/Instruments (Northern and Southern Philippines)
- Art Song/Kundiman
- Filipino folksongs
- Philippine Rondalla

Dr. Marfil will discuss indigenous music, including musical instruments commonly used and performed by indigenous people. In art song/kundiman, she will talk about two popular kundiman composers (Nicanor Abelardo and Francisco Santiago). Filipino folksongs will deal with two examples from different regions in the Philippines. Lastly, she will discuss the Rondalla music. Samples of videos will be shown performed by the University of the Philippines Rondalla.

Additionally, Dr. Marfil will conduct two workshops on "Learning the Basics of Rondalla Music" on *January 24, 2024 and January 26, 2024, 3:00-5:00 pm, Moore Hall 119.*

The workshops will present the Philippine Rondalla consisting of bandurria, laud, guitar and double bass. Only nine participants can participate using these instruments provided by the lecturer. She graduated with a Bachelor of Music (Cum Laude) and Master of Music in Composition (University of the Philippines), Master of Arts in Music Theory as a Fulbright Scholar (State University of New York, Buffalo), and Ph.D. in Composition (University of Hawai'i). In 2022, she was able to publish her first Rondalla book entitled Likha Rondaya: Original Works and Arrangements for Rondalla. She was also the arranger and performer of the album Kawili 2 produced by the Hawaii Institute for Philippine Studies.
