Dear Complex Area Superintendent Ruth Silberstein,

The Hawai'i Department of Health's, Healthy Hawai'i Initiative (HHI), was established in 2000 to promote healthy lifestyles in communities, schools, and workplaces. Through the use of HHI funds, the Hawai'i Department of Education (DOE) has been able to employ Health and Physical Education (PE) Resource Teachers as a means of promoting standards-based health and PE instruction in Hawai'i public schools. The work of the HHI resource teachers (RTs) supports DOE's vision: *"Hawaii's students are educated, healthy, and joyful lifelong learners who contribute positively to our community and global society."*

Attached is a report that provides an overview of state and district professional development activities along with a more detailed summary for your Complex Area during the 2015-2016 school year. This report acknowledges that 77 teachers/staff from 15 of the 28 schools in your Complex Area participated in 70 HHI health and PE professional development events.

In addition to professional development, the HHI RTs also provide support for health and PE in your Complex Area schools through a lending library of instructional resources, technical assistance for student fitness assessment, fitness meets, and a PE Fair. There were 21 schools in your Complex Area that completed fitness assessments, 7 schools that participated in elementary fitness meets, and 10 schools that received Excellence in Wellness awards in your Complex Area last year.

Your continued support of health and PE is greatly appreciated. Evidence shows that the health of students is linked to their academic achievement, so by working together, we can ensure that young people are healthy and ready to learn. Overview

The Healthy Hawai'i Initiative (HHI) District Health and Physical Education Resource Teachers (RTs) lead workshops, faculty in-services, one-on-one trainings, and other health and PE-related activities in their district. These professional development events are interactive, of high quality, and include the latest developments in the field. The RTs provide opportunities for follow-up and reflection on applying the new skills and they also offer technical assistance in implementing the Hawai'i Department of Education Wellness Guidelines.

During the 2015-2016 school year, the HHI RTs conducted a total of 263 professional development events statewide, including 5 county workshops, 12 PDE3 courses, 181 one-on-one trainings, 36 faculty in-services, 13 complex trainings, 3 district trainings, 3 state workshops/conferences, and 10 additional professional development events. A total of 972 unique (non-repeat) participants throughout the state completed at least one HHI training event last school year.

School Level Summary for Fitness Testing, Fitness Meets, and Wellness Awards

This summary indicates the name of the schools that completed fitness testing and participated in an elementary fitness meet during the 2015-2016 school year (Table 10). Approximately 300 students participated in fitness meets in the Kaimuki-McKinley-Roosevelt Complex. In addition, 10 schools received an “Excellence in Wellness” award for meeting 90% or more of the Wellness Guidelines in 2015-2016.
