Dear Complex Area Superintendent Art Souza,

The Hawai'i Department of Health's, Healthy Hawai'i Initiative (HHI), was established in 2000 to promote healthy lifestyles in communities, schools, and workplaces. Through the use of HHI funds, the Hawai'i Department of Education (DOE) has been able to employ Health and Physical Education (PE) Resource Teachers as a means of promoting standards-based health and PE instruction in Hawai'i public schools. The work of the HHI resource teachers (RTs) supports DOE's vision: *"Hawaii's students are educated, healthy, and joyful lifelong learners who contribute positively to our community and global society."*

Attached is a report that provides an overview of state and district professional development activities along with a more detailed summary for your Complex Area during the 2014-2015 school year. This report acknowledges that 94 teachers/staff from all 19 schools in your Complex Area participated in 34 HHI health and PE professional development events.

In addition to professional development, the HHI RTs also provide support for health and PE in your Complex Area schools through a lending library of instructional resources, technical assistance for student fitness assessment, fitness meets, and a PE Fair. There were 8 schools in your Complex Area that completed fitness assessments last year.

Your continued support of health and PE is greatly appreciated. Evidence shows that the health of students is linked to their academic achievement, so by working together, we can ensure that young people are healthy and ready to learn. Overview

The Healthy Hawai'i Initiative (HHI) District Health and Physical Education Resource Teachers (RTs) lead workshops, faculty in-services, one-on-one trainings, and other health and PE-related activities in their district. These professional development events are interactive, of high quality, and include the latest developments in the field. The RTs also provide opportunities for follow-up and reflection on the implementation of new skills. Offering statewide professional development in health and physical education is expected to facilitate and enhance teachers' application of skills, knowledge, and curricula.

During the 2014-2015 school year, the HHI RTs conducted a total of 393 professional development events statewide, including 5 county workshops, 10 PDE3 courses, 337 one-on-one trainings, 28 faculty in-services, and 13 additional professional development events. A total of 674 unique (non-repeat) participants throughout the state participated in at least one HHI training event last school year.
