#### TIPS FOR AVOIDING STEREOTYPES IN BOOKS & TOYS

- Look for books and images of POC adults and kids engaging in everyday activities & different kinds of families
- Label countries and cultures- builds cross cultural understanding


#### LAST SESSION

LEARNING: CATEGORIZING PEOPLE 1.RESPONDING TO BIASED REMARKS

2. INTRO PROPER ETHNIC AND RACIAL LABELS

- Should I introduce the word "racism" to 4-5 year olds? Can say, "Racism is treating someone unfairly because of the color of their skin or their race." Focus on present rather than past examples.
- Learn to pronounce people's names correctly.
- If the teacher calls home...unpacking the role of shame and releasing it.
- Spend time with kids and adults of other races. More meaningful than any well crafted conversations.

#### **ELEMENTARY SCHOOL**

LEARNING: IMPACT OF RACISM ON SOCIETY

#### LAST SESSION

1. RACE NOT BIOLOGICALLY REAL, BUT SOCIALLY REAL

2.CROSS RACIAL FRIENDSHIPS

- Building on definition of racism: "All the beliefs, behaviors, and laws in our society that harm African American, Black, Latinx, Asian, Indigenous people and other people of color."
- Teach kids "racist" is not a slur. Most people believe both racist and antiracist ideas.
- As parents, we should make sure kids learn complex versions of history that they may not learn in school.
- Importance of cross-racial friendships at elementary school age have the greatest impact

#### MIDDLE & HIGH SCHOOL LAST SESSION

LEARNING:
SEGREGATION IN SCHOOLS,
EVEN DIVERSE ONES

1. CODED RACIST LANGUAGE

2. RACIST STEREOTYPES FROM ACADEMIC TRACKING

- Disrupting the phrase "that's so racist!" Noticing race
- is not racist, and we can't undo racism if we don't talk about race.
- Teens often get basic factual information about race and racism wrong.
   We must be direct to confront the stereotypes they are absorbing.
- Identifying white saviorism in movies

- Watch: "White Savior: The Movie Trailer" from the Seth Myers Show (LOL)
